
Letters were originally sent to the Chiefs of nearby Mi'kmaq First Nation communities in 2009 to notify of the project and proposed environmental background studies which began in 2010.

NBDTI would like to reiterate its willingness to meet and discuss any questions or concerns that you may have. In addition, the project proposal was referred to the Department of Fisheries and Oceans to determine if the proposed work could result in serious harm to fish that are part of a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal (CRA) fishery or to fish that support such a fishery. It has been determined that the project will require a Fisheries Act Authorization. Appropriate offsetting measures will be undertaken by NBDTI to compensate for any impacts to CRA fisheries. Transport Canada may have a regulatory role for this project and also wish to accompany NBDTI on any discussions with First Nation communities.
