The benefits associated with the removal of the station are significant. By removing the MTGS, approximately 16 kms representing 5 million square meters of productive habitat will become accessible to several sea-run fish species, creating positive impacts in the St. Croix River and Passamaquoddy Bay. Our proposal to remove MTGS has been welcomed by your representative(s).

For NB Power, the removal of the station and resulting positive environmental impacts provide required compensation for Fisheries Act Authorizations (FAA) associated with generating facilities at Point Lepreau, Coleson Cove, Bayside and Belledune. As you are aware, NB Power is proposing to decommission the Milltown Generating Station and restore Salmon Falls. The project will free 16 km of the St. Croix River and make available five million square meters of fish habitat in the St. Croix and its tributaries on the Canadian side of the border. The engineering and environmental specifics to support the project are currently underway. For your reference, I have attached a photo of the Militown generating station as it exists today.

Options for the project range from a full removal of all structures to leaving parts of the structures in place. The preferred option will be selected following consultation with Rights Holders, Stakeholders, and the public and must allow for volitional fish passage. The detailed plans of the project will be made available for review as part of the EIA Registration document in the coming months. The intended project timeline is to restore volitional fish passage at Salmon Falls by spring 2022.

The project requires approval under the New Brunswick Clean Environment Act, Regulation 87-83: Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). As you know, we routinely meet with representatives for Kopit Lodge. During those meetings, we will continue to discuss progress on the proposed project and invite input and feedback. Because Milltown Generating Station is in traditional Peskotomuhkati territory, our engagement and consultation with Chief Hugh Akagi and staff is deep for this particular project.

The benefits associated with the removal of the station are significant. By removing the MTGS, approximately 16 kms representing 5 million square meters of productive habitat will become accessible to several sea-run fish species, creating positive impacts in the St. Croix River and Passamaquoddy Bay. Our proposal to remove MTGS has been welcomed by your representative(s).

For NB Power, the removal of the station and resulting positive environmental impacts provide required compensation for Fisheries Act Authorizations (FAA) associated with generating facilities at Point Lepreau, Coleson Cove, Bayside and Belledune. As you are aware, NB Power is proposing to decommission the Milltown Generating Station and restore Salmon Falls. The project will free 16 km of the St. Croix River and make available five million square meters of fish habitat in the St. Croix and its tributaries on the Canadian side of the border. The engineering and environmental specifics to support the project are currently underway. For your reference. I have attached a photo of the Milltown generating station as it exists today.

Options for the project range from a full removal of all structures to leaving parts of the structures in place. The preferred option will be selected following consultation with Rights Holders, Stakeholders, and the public and must allow for volitional fish passage. The detailed plans of the project will be made available for review as part of the EIA Registration document in the coming months. The intended project timeline is to restore volitional fish passage at Salmon Falls by spring 2022.

The project requires approval under the New Brunswick Clean Environment Act, Regulation 87-83: Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). NB Power is undertaking a detailed engineering evaluation of the St. Croix River and existing infrastructure, as well as review of historical records, to determine the original location of Salmon Falls and most effective method of infrastructure removal that will allow for the provision of volitional fish passage past the falls. The intent is to remove all required existing infrastructure so that fish passage is not impeded.

NB Power is also proposing to leverage the project to support Fisheries Act Authorizations for its Point Leperau, Coleson Cove, Bayside and Belledune generating stations. Information regarding our applications to the Department of Fisheries and Ocean will be provided to your technical staff as part of the consultative process. Department of Fisheries and Ocean have indicated that Fisheries Act Authorizations cannot be issued to NB Power until the Environmental Assessment for the project is completed.



NB Power understands that Mi'gmawe'l Tplu'taqnn Inc. is authorized to enter into consultation and engagement with proponents on your behalf. NB Power holds regular meetings with MTI staff to discuss projects, and is planning information sessions for your community. Unless you indicate otherwise, we will continue to provide project information to MTI as it becomes available, and MTI can provide updates through your community liaison or community sessions as required.

Please note that the Department of Aboriginal Affairs is copied on this letter. As such we expect an initial assessment being issued that informs the scope and depth of the consultative process requirements.
