Appendix A - Fees Act

#### INTRODUCTION

The Fees Act (see **Appendix A)** received Royal assent in the spring of 2008. This legislation, which applies to Part I of the public service, established a transparent process governing fees charged by government departments.

It requires detailed information to be made public on all upcoming fee increases and all new fees at least 60 days before implementation by government departments.

The act also specifies that, by January 31st each year, the Minister of Finance must file a document containing such information with the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly. The 2010 document contains detailed information regarding new fees and fee increases planned by government departments for the upcoming fiscal year of 2010-2011.

The report also includes information such as the legal authority to charge each fee, the current fee amount, the new fee amount, effective date of the change, revenue details, and departmental contact information.

The first section in the 2010 report summarizes fee changes and/or new fees approved by the provincial Board of Management since publication of the 2009 report.

The second section summarizes upcoming fee changes and/or new fees approved by the Board of Management for the fiscal year 2010-2011. In keeping with the requirement of 60-day minimum notice to the public, none of these fees will take effect until at least April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2010.

It should be noted that the *Fees Act* does allow a department to create or increase fees *during* the upcoming fiscal year. If this occurs, the individual department will file a document with the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly containing the same type of details as are included in this report. The fee change is also subject to the requirement of a minimum 60-day notice to the public.

If there are any mid-year changes, the details of these single filings will be summarized and published in the 2011 report on fees. This compilation will maintain accuracy and transparency concerning fees.

The report also includes information about a few fees being decreased or eliminated.

#### **How to Read This Report**

Section 3(2) of the *Fees Act* requires this *Annual Report on Fees* to present the following information for new and increased fees proposed for the next fiscal year:

- (a) the name of the department that proposed the fee
- (b) the name of the fee
- (c) the legislative authority for the fee
- (d) the amount of the current fee, if any
- (e) the amount of the new fee or the increased fee
- (f) the effective date for the new fee or the increased fee
- (g) the total annual revenue expected from the fee
- (h) the change in the annual revenue expected from the fee, and
- (i) the name of the contact person.

Readers should note that "New Annual Revenue Estimate" presents the total expected revenue from the fee at the proposed or increased rate for the upcoming fiscal year. "Change in Annual Revenue" indicates how much additional annual revenue is expected per fiscal year from the new fee rate, as opposed to the prior rate.

While the Minister of Finance is responsible to file this document each January with the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, information about particular fees should always be obtained from the specific departments and contacts listed in the description of each fee.

These handling fees are paid directly to the redemption centres without government involvement. Revenue increases noted above will benefit the redemption centres exclusively.

There are currently 78 beverage container redemption centres processing approximately 290 million empty beverage containers annually.

**Comments:** A formal appeal process is being created for the results of the Crown land forest operations compliance audits. These audits are carried out on licensee and sub-licensee Crown land forest operations. Upon submission of an appeal, the appellant will post a \$3,500 bond to be returned if the appeal is granted. If the appeal is rejected, the bond will be forfeited.

**Comments:** A system of audits assesses licensee and sub-licensee compliance with various standards regarding their forest operations on Crown land. A simpler penalty system based upon three categorized levels of impact to the environment or forest resource will replace the current penalty structure. The process for penalty determination will incorporate a consideration of whether the non-compliance occurred despite all reasonable efforts by the licensee or sub-licensee to follow standards and employ best management practices and will be sensitive to the frequency of occurrence of the particular non-compliance. Compliance action plans which ensure continuous improvement of licensee and sub-licensee operational procedures and public reporting of audit results are also important features of the penalty system.

**Comments**: The proposed Lands Administration Regulation will replace the existing Leasing Regulation, which was established in 1989. The proposed regulation will change fees and rents payable for all dispositions of Crown land (leases, licences of occupation, easements and rights-of-way). The changes will have the effect of reducing the number of different lease rents payable from 20 to eight. Rent increases will affect current users of Crown land as of June 1, 2009. The licence of occupation rent increases will affect new applicants and current users upon tenure renewal. Fee increases will affect existing tenure holders, upon renewal or assignment, and all new applicants.

**Comments**: On June 2, 2009, the government adopted a new Lands Administration Regulation that established new Crown land rents, bringing them closer to market rates and providing a reasonable financial return to the Province for the use of Crown lands. The Regulation called for a three-year incremental increase in Crown land rents.

The government now intends to freeze rental rates for the use of Crown lands at the current rates. As a result, the rent increases scheduled for 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 will **not** be implemented.

For the fiscal year 2009-2010, rents were calculated at two months rent at the old rate for April and May, with the remaining 10 months at the rate approved on June 2, 2009. The "**change in annual revenue**" shown above is the increase that will result in fiscal year 2010-2011 by charging 12 months at the June 2, 2009, approved rates. It should be noted, however, that rents for 2010-2011 were regulated to increase on April 1, 2010, and the decision to hold rents at the current rates will actually result in foregone revenues in the amount of \$570,000.

The \$400 approval and examination fee is applied on a per unit basis to a maximum of 50 units, or \$20,000. The new act and the correlating fees will come into force January 1, 2010.

**Comments**: The services provided by the Agricultural Laboratory include a range of analytical services for field and greenhouse soil, livestock feed, plant tissue and soil amendments, including manure and compost. These services are available to primary agricultural producers, the general public and departmental staff as well as in support of research activities and implementation of the *Livestock Operations Act*. The government of New Brunswick has increased numerous fees for service in an effort to increase revenues and improve fiscal responsibility.

# Schedule Agricultural Laboratory

Individuals entitled to use the designation "Registered Professional Agricultural Producer," as described under s. 4(1) of the *Agricultural Producers Registration and Farm Organizations Funding Act*, are eligible for a fifty percent (50%) reduction in fees. **Comments:** The *Provincial Building Regulation, 2002 - Community Planning Act,* prohibits a person from undertaking or continuing the building, locating, relocating, demolishing, altering or replacement of a building or structure in an unincorporated area, or a rural community without a building by-law, unless a development and building permit has been issued under that Regulation. A person seeking to obtain a development and building permit must apply in writing to the development officer or building inspector, as the case may be, having jurisdiction in the area where the land involved is located. The revenue generated by these fees will be collected by the District Planning Commission and used to offset contributions from the unincorporated areas.

**Comments:** Beverage container handling fees are paid by beverage distributors to New Brunswick's privately-run beverage container redemption centres as compensation for receiving, paying out refunds for, sorting, and storing returned beverage containers. These handling fees are paid directly to the redemption centres without government involvement. The increase in the handling fees means that beverage distributors will be paying more to the redemption centres. The change will not increase revenues to government.

There are currently 78 beverage container redemption centres processing approximately 305 million empty beverage containers annually.

There are 56 licensed funeral providers (homes) in the province, and the amended statute requires each funeral home to be licensed and to have a licensed manager. In the past, individuals were licensed to sell pre-arranged funeral contracts, but the home was not licensed and there was no designated licensed manager. The change in revenue reflects the increase in the cost to be licensed as a manager, rather than as a funeral director, and a reduction in individuals licensed. (Fee change from \$200 to \$250).

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick, enacts as follows:

#### **Definitions**

1 The following definitions apply in this Act.

"department" means a portion of the Public Service specified in Part I of the First Schedule of the *Public Service Labour Relations Act.* (ministère)

"fee" means a fee, levy, royalty or other charge fixed by regulation under the authority of a public Act of the Province. (droit)

#### **Application of the Act**

**2** This Act applies to all fees proposed by departments.

### **Annual report on fees**

- **3**(1) On or before January 31 in each fiscal year, the Minister of Finance shall file an annual report on fees with the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly.
- **3**(2) The annual report shall contain the following information for every new fee and increase in a fee proposed for the next fiscal year:

(a) the name of the department that proposed the fee;
(b) the name of the fee;
(c) the legislative authority for the fee;
(d) the amount of the current fee, if any;
(e) the amount of the new fee or the increased fee;
(f) the effective date for the new fee or the increased fee;
(g) the total annual revenue expected from the fee;
(h) the change in the annual revenue expected from the fee; and
(i) the name of the contact person.
<ul><li>3(3) The effective date for any new fee or increased fee shall be not less than 60 days after the annual report is filed.</li><li>3(4) The annual report shall also contain information regarding the fees introduced, changed or eliminated since the previous annual report.</li></ul>
Other reports on fees
<b>4</b> (1) If a new fee or an increase in a fee is proposed during a fiscal year and the fee is not included in the annual report referred to in subsection 3(1), the Minister responsible for the Act that authorizes the fee shall file a report with the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly at least 60 days before the effective date for the new fee or the increased fee.
<b>4</b> (2) The report shall contain the information referred to in subsection 3(2).
