

BERRY BROOK

DESCRIPTION

- Location: Upsalquitch River
- Stretch type: Daily Crown Reserve
- Stretch length: 6.5 kilometres
- Number of named pools: 14
- River width: 30 metres
- River bottom: gravel, rock, and ledge
- Access to pools is by canoe, or some on foot. Motorized canoe recommended: 6-10 hp. No falls or rapids.

ACCESS (see corresponding numbers on map)

NOTE: Access to certain stretch may require four-wheel drive vehicles.

- **Distances given are approximate and may not correspond exactly to the reading on your odometer**
- Look for yellow Crown Reserve signs along the road.

Travelling on Route 17 (the road appears in yellow on the map)

- From Campbellton, travel **West** on **Route 17**, and turn left after the big bridge crossing the Upsalquitch River.

OR

- From Kedgwick, travel **East** on **Route 17**, and turn right before the big bridge crossing the Upsalquitch River.
1. From the intersection of Route 17 and the Upsalquitch River Road, travel 9.1 km along the river to a big cement bridge.
 2. **Option 1 - first boat landing**
Turn left to cross the bridge; the boat landing will be on the left, just after the bridge.

OR

3. **Option 2 – second boat landing** (the road appears in green on the map)
Do not cross the bridge, but continue straight along the Upsalquitch River Road for 1.7 km to the second boat landing. It is only a small road to your left down to the river (100m).

ACCOMMODATIONS

- Wilderness camping is suggested; no accommodations available (no table, no shelter, no fire pit)
- Two boat landing sites
- **Anglers must provide their own drinking water.**
- Firewood is not provided. It is recommended that only kiln dried firewood be brought to Crown Reserve to minimize the risk of spreading invasive insects and disease. If using firewood that has not been kiln dried, buy it locally (as close to your destination as possible), burn it all on site and do not bring any remaining firewood home.
- Garbage removal is the angler's responsibility. Littering is strictly prohibited.

REGULATIONS

- For information on current salmon conservation measures such as live release requirements, visit the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada website.
- General angling regulations for New Brunswick are in effect. Consult the *Fish* book for additional information.
