

GROUNDHOG LANDING

DESCRIPTION

- Location: North Branch Sevogle RiverStretch type: Regular Crown Reserve
- Stretch length: 6 kilometres
 Number of named pools: 11
 River width: 8–23 metres
- River bottom: gravel, rock, ledge, some large rocks
- Additional information: no rapids or falls. Anglers must wade the river to access lower pools.
- Lower pools have very steep banks caution advised.

ACCESS (See corresponding numbers on map)

NOTE: Access to certain stretches may require four-wheel drive vehicles.

- 1. From the city of Miramichi, travel 28.5 km to Wayerton Bridge (Northwest Miramichi River).
- 2. From Wayerton Bridge, travel 3.5 km to the Fraser Burchill Road (gravel left side).
- 3. On the Fraser Burchill Road, travel 11.2 km to the Groundhog Landing Stretch access road (left side).
- 4. On the Groundhog Landing Stretch access road, travel 0.8 km to the Y in the road. Bear right.
- 5. After the Y in the Groundhog Landing Stretch access road, travel 0.3 km to the Groundhog Landing Stretch Camp.

ACCOMMODATIONS

- Camp: accommodates four (4) people
- Beds: four (4) single beds with mattresses
- Amenities: wood stove, table, sink, benches, broom, mop, and outside toilet facilities
- Water: camp has gravity fed water when conditions are favourable. <u>Anglers must provide their own drinking water.</u>
- Wired for generator use
- Incidentals: all equipment not listed above is the responsibility of the angler
- Firewood is not provided. It is recommended that only kiln dried firewood be brought to Crown Reserve to minimize the risk of spreading invasive insects and disease. If using firewood that has not been kiln dried, buy it locally (as close to your destination as possible), burn it all on site and do not bring any remaining firewood home.
- Garbage removal is the angler's responsibility. Littering is strictly prohibited.

REGULATIONS

- General angling regulations for New Brunswick are in effect. Consult the Fish book for additional information.
